

Optimist Club of Warrensburg, Missouri

Calling all youth!!!!!! Each year, the Optimist International Foundation promotes both an essay and oratorical contest. Our club hosts the local Oratorical contest every year here in Warrensburg. The contest will be held March 26 at 6:30 p.m. at a location to be determined soon. This is a great opportunity to carn scholarship SSSS as well as gain speaking experience.

Since its start in 1928, the Optimist Oratorical Contest has become the longest-running program sponsored by Optimist International. This year's oratorical 'topic Just iMagine a World without Boundaries? is a theme with a very broad spectrum of interpretation. The contest is designed for youth to gain experience in public speaking and provide them with the opportunity to compete for a college scholarship. It is very easy to apply for the contest. Interested students should prepare a 4- to 5-minute speech on the assigned topic to present at the contest. The speeches are judged at the Club level, Regional level (if needed) and then at the District level. Our first and second place winners will go directly to Regionals' to compete for a \$500 award. District winners get scholarships of \$2500, \$1500 and \$1000.

Youth of all ages are encouraged to compete and gain experience and give their view on the topic. The contest is open to youth under the age of 19 as of October 1st of the current Optimist International contest year (October 1 – September 30) and is not enrolled as a degree seeking student of a post-secondary institution. There is no minimum age.

Long-term owners of Missouri farms are proud of their family accomplishments. This was evident during the Centennial Farm program held in Missouri during the American Revolution Bicentennial Year of 1976. In that popular program, 2,850 Missouri farm owners in 105 of Missouri's 114 counties were recognized as owning a "Centennial Farm."

Interest in the program continued after 1976. Several Missouri farm owners asked about having their farms recognized, so the University of Missouri College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources and University of Missouri Extension planned a 10-year update in 1986 called the "Century Farm" program. During this update, 1,080 additional Missouri farms were recognized.

Long-term family farm owners who were not able to take part in the 1976 or 1986 events still wanted recognition, so the College and MU Extension planned for annual updates. Missouri Farm Bureau joined as a program co-sponsor in 2008. This program has been sustained as a yearly event with over 100 farms recognized each year.

Guidelines

- Guidelines used in the selection and recognition of Missouri Century Farms:
- 1. The same family must have owned the farm for 100 consecutive years or more as of Dec. 31, 2020.
- The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, grandchildren, siblings, or nephews or nieces, including through marriage or adoption.
- The present farm shall consist of no less than 40 acres of the original land and shall make a financial contribution to the overall farm income.

Sponsorship

WIL Extension, the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, and the Missouri Farm Bureau jointly sponsor the Missouri Century Farms program. Local MU Extension Councils help with sponsorship by publicizing the program, collecting and certifying nominations, and arranging for local recognition. The Extension Web Services team coordinates the program.

Application

Applications are available starting February 1 each year from the MU Extension office in your county or from University of Missouri-Century Farms, 506 Hitt St., Whitten Hall, Room 4, Columbia, MO 65211. They must be turned in by May 1.

A fee of \$100 is required to cover processing costs, one certificate, a booklet and one two-sided metal sign (includes MU and Missouri Farm Bureau logos) for each approved farm.

Send a completed application, order form and a check made payable to University of Missouri-Century Farms for the total amount on your order form. Return completed applications to University of Missouri-Century Farms, 506 Hitt St., Whitten Hall, Room 4, Columbia, MO 65211, or to the MU Extension office in the county where your farm is located. The 2020 Census is closer than you think! Here's a quick refresher of what it is and why it's essential that everyone is counted.

Everyone counts.

The census counts every person living in the United States once, only once, and in the right place.




Article 1 Section 2

It's in the Constitution.

The U.S. Constitution mandates that everyone in the country be counted every 10 years. The first census was in 1790.

It's about fair representation.

Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.



It's about \$675 billion.



The distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds, grants, and support to states, counties, and communities are based on census data.

That money is spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works, and other vital programs.



It's about redistricting.

After each decade's census, state officials redraw the boundaries of the congressional and state legislative districts in their states to account for population shifts.

Taking part is your civic duty.

Completing the census is mandatory: it's a way to participate in our democracy and say "I COUNT!"

Dennis' Story: My Partner for Fast Stroke Care

When Dennis Orr woke up on January 10th he didn't know that he would end up receiving lifesaving emergency care moments later. He started his normal morning routine to get ready and spend another day with his wife, Deborah, when he noticed that his left leg felt strange. Soon his left arm was behaving the same and his wife noticed and began to assess him. Dennis wanted to lay down and sleep the symptoms off, but Deborah knew he was showing signs for a stroke and had him recite his alphabet. When Dennis struggled to enunciate even a single letter she immediately rushed him to Western Missouri Medical Center's (WMMC) Emergency Department.

Being FAST

Dennis stumbled into the Emergency Department violently ill and while Deborah reported his stroke symptoms to the receptionist. Within minutes a nurse got him into a wheelchair and got him to the Trauma room to start the process of getting Dennis' symptoms under control.

When a stroke happens, it's critical to move fast because the first 60 minutes are crucial for receiving care and preventing long-term health issues. A stroke occurs when blood flow to an artery of the brain is blocked or ruptures, and every minute that a stroke goes untreated 1.9 million brain cells are lost. The medication tPA, a clot bursting drug, can be given to stroke patients but the longer it takes to get the medication the more brain cells that are lost. Ideally a stroke patient should get the tPA medication within one hour to decrease the risk of long-term brain damage.

His nurses then brought in the telemedicine robot so he could speak to a neurologist from BlueSky who did an assessment. Dennis was administered the tPA medication after the doctor confirmed he was having a stroke before he went to Research Medical Center.

To ensure that WMMC's stroke patients receive complete and comprehensive care, after receiving initial diagnosis and treat-

















ment all stroke patients are sent to a Level I Stroke Center. This allows for the patient to receive additional tests and access to neurosurgical services should further surgery be needed as a part of their treatment.

Dennis was sent to Research Medical Center for his follow up care but was feeling back to normal by the time he arrived. "When I arrived at Research, 95% of my symptoms were gone and I made it clear I would be home to watch the Chiefs play in the Super Bowl!" Dennis stated. "But I am healthy and back to normal because my wife recognized my symptoms and the excellent and fast treatment from WMMC."

Because of how fast Dennis and his wife reacted to get him the medication quickly, Dennis has no long-term damage or symptoms and he is back to living his life as a Chief's fan in Warrensburg.

How You Can Prevent Long Term Stroke Damage

If a stroke goes untreated, the consequences is brain damage that can result in paralysis, difficulty speaking, balance and dizziness issues, memory loss, emotional changes, changes in behavior, and fatigue. It is necessary that patients get vital treatment when having a stroke.

Patients who are experiencing facial drooping, arm or leg drooping, or speech difficulty should be rushed to the nearest Level III Stroke Center. Time is incredibly critical during a stroke and WMMC is a Level III Stroke Center where staff are constantly ready at a moment's notice to provide a rapid response for stroke care. Founded in 2014, the Veterans Clinic within the University of Missouri's School of Law (https://law.missouri.edu/veterans-clinic/) launched this exciting initiative "Tiger's for Troops" to provide assistance to veterans in rural Missouri. Under this program, the Clinic is partnering with the University of Missouri Extension to connect law students and supervising attorneys, to visit Extension offices throughout the State to educate veterans about available resources, as well as to assist them with disability claims and appeals and discharge upgrades. Supervised by attorneys Angela K. Drake and Brent Filbert, students actually interview clients, witnesses, and medical personnel as well as conduct research to develop the law and facts of the case. The students draft documents and prepare briefs relating to VA benefits and discharge upgrades.

Professor Drake, who is a self-professed Army brat, and a product of the G.I. Bill, has extensive experience in civil litigation, including cases involving medical records. She was a partner in the Kansas City firm of Niewald, Waldeck and Brown until 2003, and continued her practice in Springfield, Mo., with Lowther Johnson, LLC as a member of the firm through 2012. In her practice, she focused on insurance defense work and complex class action litigation. Prof. Drake also teaches Trial Practice and Pretrial Litigation at the University of Missouri School of Law. CAPT Filbert Brent, USN (ret.), is a MU alumnus and previously served as a deputy chief defense counsel for military commissions at the Pentagon, a partner at Shook, Hardy & Bacon, and litigation counsel at Hughes, Hubbard & Reed
