Mirroring the indigenous practice of burning prairie to refresh the balance of annuals, perennials and grasses to their ultimate vigor, Johnson County Citizens for Environmental Action (CEA) has arranged for a burning of a portion of Turkeyfoot Prairie in mid-November. The group seeks volunteers who will help to manage the burn according to the instructions from the certified burn administrator who will be leading the project.

The planned burn will take on roughly a third of the seven-acre tallgrass section of the property. Ideal weather conditions are necessary for a burn to take place, so the target dates for the burn to take place are Saturday, November 14, and if that doesn't work, Sunday, November 15 and then Tuesday, November 17. Burn time is tentatively scheduled for 10:00 am each of those days.

Vern can let you know more about what will be expected of you as a volunteer, including the appropriate clothing to wear for a burn, and tools you might be expected to use on the project.

Warrensburg's Turkeyfoot Prairie is located within Warrensburg's West Park, on SW 101 Road – just across the road from the Johnson County's Old Drum Animal Shelter. The property is owned and managed by the Warrensburg Park and Recreation Department, with the assistance of Citizens for Environmental Action (CEA) volunteers.
